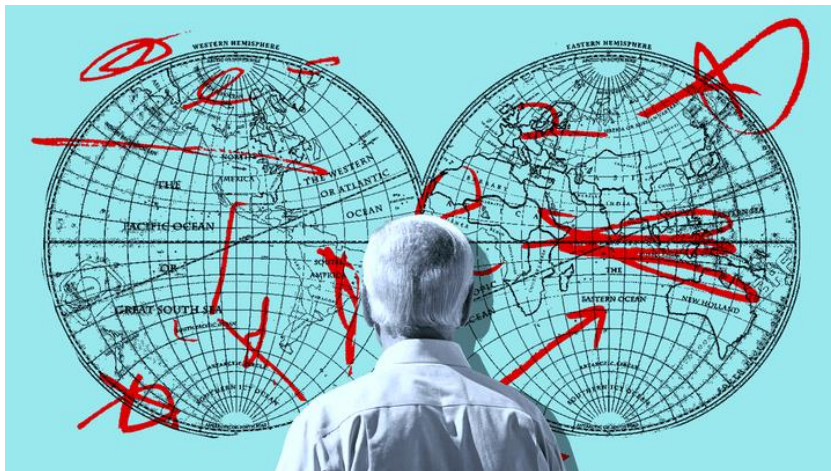

The presidential election in a hugely polarized United States was much anticipated around the globe – and not least among European transatlanticists. During their campaigns, while Joe Biden and Donald Trump differed fundamentally on some foreign policy issues (such as the response to the Coronavirus crisis, multilateralism, and climate change), there was much agreement between them on cybersecurity, the US's position towards China, and the use of military force. We are now confronted with the question whether the differences or the commonalities will determine the American foreign policy agenda of the next four years. Will transatlantic relations return to the relative harmony of the Obama years or will antagonism prevail?
